## Meet the Emeriti Association President: Carolyn Gang

Carolyn Gang is an only child, which was both a blessing and a curse. She grew up in Perry, OK, where her father was an accountant with ODOT and her mother was a "June Cleaver" homemaker. As a result, she loved numbers and never learned to cook. Her parents were much older when she was born, and her father would tell people that they found her under a rock. When asked by her first-grade teacher where she was born, she said "under a rock" and ended up in the Principal's Office. Fortunately, her father was on the school board and admitted that is what the child had heard. From that point on, Enid, OK, was ingrained into her brain as place of birth.

Another result of being an only child was that she had to entertain herself. Carolyn loved the public library and would go there almost every day. She loved to read, loved to draw, and took piano lessons. Those activities developed into life-long adventures.

When Carolyn was a teenager, the family moved to Duncan, OK. During that time, she developed a new skill – writing! She was placed in an accelerated English class and loved it. She graduated from Duncan High School and was chosen as 1 of 5 students to write the Senior Skit for graduation. Her parents also took her to Broadway productions in nearby Lawton, OK. She couldn't get enough of the theatre.

Two weeks after high school graduation in 1970, she was at OSU. She pledged a sorority and was very active on campus. She started out as a music major and switched to education her freshman year. She and her piano professor had very different ideas about how Bach should be played. Switching to education was a game changer – she was fortunate to have some fabulous mentors who really encouraged her. As a result, she was named a Redskin Congratulate Top Twelve Senior at OSU in May 1974. These same mentors convinced her not to go to the University of Texas but to stay at OSU for her masters. Again, she had Dr. Norman Durhan as a mentor during graduate school and Dr. Jim Seals as her major advisor. The truth is, Carolyn loved school. She received her M.S in Student Personnel & Guidance in December 1975.

Carolyn started an Ed.D. but didn't finish--life got in the way. While waiting for her dream job, she worked as a secretary in Ag Econ, and Dr. Joe Williams was one of her bosses. She stayed with Ag Econ for about 5 months and then accepted the position as the first Coordinator of Student Employment. From there she went into academic advising in the College of Arts & Sciences and later with the Psychology Department. The 5 years she was with Psychology, she was named the Outstanding Advisor for Arts & Sciences twice.

In 1990, she married fellow OSU graduate Ed Noltensmeyer. She basically left OSU as a paid employee but started getting involved with OSU boards and departments and various community boards. She also briefly worked for the Oklahoma Tobacco Settlement Trust and did long-term substitute teaching. Her passions are the arts, children's issues, and genealogy. She enjoys fundraising and putting together events. She currently serves as an officer or on the board of 10 organizations and strongly believes in giving back to OSU and the community.

Carolyn still can't cook, but she can organize a gala in a second--and enjoys being of the age where she doesn't have to filter.
